















Discussion Questions for Jasmine Green Rescues: A Piglet Called Truffle

- 3. This book has a lot of facts about animals and their behavior. What is something you learned about one of these animals?
- 4. Jasmine realizes what she wants to do when she grows up: rescue and board animals. Do you think she would be good at this? Would you like to work with animals when you grow up?
- 5. Were you surprised that Jasmine's parents let her keep Truffle? Why did they change their minds?




Jasmine Green Rescues: A Piglet Called Truffle Group Activity





- 3. Multiple instruments are named in this book: trumpets, maracas, congas, and saxophones. Are you familiar with any of these instruments? Is there one you would like to learn how to play?
- 4. This book features lifelike illustrations of people dancing and playing music. Which illustration is your favorite? Why?
- 5. The mambo dance developed when mambo music became popular in Latin America. Why do you think music is important to the way you dance?



Grab a partner and work together to create a dance to mambo music. Then play some songs and take turns showing off your moves as if you're in a competition at the Palladium!



- 2. Max jumps very high when he sees that there is a snake underneath him. Would you react the same way? Do you think snakes are cool or scary?
- 3. Max knows that he is in a book and he talks to the narrator. He even changes the story! Have you ever seen this happen in any other book?
- 4. In the last story, Max says that he does not want to fly; he wants to take a nap. If you were writing your own story, would you choose to fly or take a nap?
- 5. If you could talk to the narrator of this book like Max, what would you say?



In pairs, take turns creating a new story about Max. One person should play the narrator while the other plays Max. What does the narrator say? How does Max react? Improvise a scene together.
